

GETTING TO KNOW YOU

In keeping with this Newsletter's tradition of spotlighting members of our club, this issue will introduce you to a family that has always supported the goals of Friendship Force both in spirit and by their deeds.



Bill and Marilyn Darmody joined the Friendship Force in 1978 during its heyday when the club had over 1,000 members. Both have served in a variety of positions on the FFGA Board of Directors, including President for Marilyn and Communications and Publicity chair for Bill. They are always among the first to step forward as volunteers when our club undertakes community service projects and are frequently in attendance at the various Friendship Force social events. As members they have traveled to Albania, Australia, Brazil, Canada, China, England, France, Germany, Ireland, Italy, Latvia, New Zealand, Peru, Republic of Georgia, South Africa and Turkey. In addition to hosting ambassadors during 20 plus inbound exchanges, they have also hosted delegates during the Open World Leadership exchanges and the foreign military officers from Fort Benning during the three years our club participated in that program. As if that were not enough, they have also attended several of the Annual FFI World Conferences over the years. Bill says that they are still in contact with many of the people they have hosted or visited as members of the Friendship Force.

A native of Hammond, Indiana, Marilyn Kouris Darmody went to Purdue University located at West Lafayette, Indiana. When she turned 21 she fulfilled a life-long dream by becoming an Eastern Airlines flight attendant. During this time she lived in Manhattan and spent free time as a tour guide for Colonial Williamsburg. Marilyn has also worked as a travel agent prior to retirement.

William (Bill) Darmody was born and raised in Syracuse, NY. He earned a Business Administration degree at Niagara University, located in Lewiston, New York. Then he enlisted in the US Army for what he thought was going to be 2 years. Instead, he retired 25 years later as a Lieutenant Colonel. During this time he earned his Master's Degree in Business Management from the University of Richmond, in Virginia.

When Bill returned from duty in Vietnam, he and Marilyn met in Skaneateles, NY. They were married in July, 1967 in the chapel at Ft. Eustis, VA where Bill was assigned. They lived on army bases around the world, including Germany and Italy, until Bill's final assignment at Headquarters, Forces Command here in Atlanta, where he retired in 1982. Bill then joined Electronic Data Systems Corporation and worked there until 1996. He again retired and he and Marilyn decided to move to Peachtree City, where they have resided ever since.




The **Evening of Enlightenment** held on June the 11th was attended by 23 FFGA members and their guests. The event began with an enjoyable oriental supper meal at the Green Ginger Asian Fusion Restaurant in Decatur. For a few of us it was our first time to experience such a wide variety of exotic choices. This reporter quickly found out that even though "wasabi root" may resemble a bit of avocado, that is where the similarity ends. The difference was quickly apparent, and I thank heaven that the waitress had supplied our table with a gallon pitcher of ice water. For those not aware, wasabi is prepared from the root of a pungent Asiatic herb and is similar in flavor to horseradish but ten times stronger.

Upon completion of our oriental supper we proceeded to the Shambhala Meditation Center, also located in Decatur. Here we were met by very pleasant staff members of the center and were requested to remove our shoes and accompany them to their classroom, a large clean and airy room with several thick pads on the floor. Those who were able were asked to sit on these with legs folded beneath or in front of them, backs straight and hands relaxed together in our laps. Until March of 2008, she was the global vice president of network booking and research for the CNN News Group, where she oversaw guest coverage for CNN's domestic and international news networks, managing a worldwide staff.

Throughout her career she has strived to promote the importance of global understanding and to unite the world's people. With Turner Broadcasting, CNN and HUM she made positive change towards "closing the Geographic Gap" in media coverage. She has also pursued various humanitarian efforts with CARE, the Fugee's Family and the United Nations.

DiBenedetto is a world trekker who often bicycles to work and who has survived Dengue Fever. I know you will welcome her and give her the support that the President will need as we strive to grow in our mission.
