



THE PRESIDENT'S CORNER: * * * * *



Changes are afoot. The CEO of Friendship Force International, Joy DiBenedetto, is in the midst of developing a new vision and long-range strategy for the organization. That's one of the primary things corporate CEOs do, focus on the longer time frame. She has invited each of you to join in this mission by responding to one or two surveys about the Friendship Force experience. I hope each of you will take time to answer the surveys; it is like voting on the future of the club.

One of the issues that must be addressed is an imbalance between clubs seeking outbound exchanges and those willing to host. This is especially true in the United Kingdom. When our club visited Cornwall in May, 2012, we were not offered a second week of homestays. Fortunately everyone created their own second week of travel in the U. K.

Another alternative to the traditional two foreign homestays formula is the domestic exchange. In June Joyce Mell led 17 of us on an abbreviated exchange to Spokane and Whidbey Island in Washington state. There were hospitable hosts in both eastern and western parts of the state. Lower costs were one advantage. Shorter homestays meant lower fees to FFI. Shorter distances traveled also meant lower costs and fewer time zones for our bodies to adjust to.

With a few exceptions, like parts of NY and NJ, you will find the domestic hosts speak the same language we do. There is not the translation problem you have with South American and European countries. There is no need to exchange your dollars for a different currency either. Be prepared to accept and enjoy domestic exchanges in future years. There are likely many interesting places you have not seen in the United States.

New subject: Near the end of our board of directors meeting on July 13 Kent Vickers announced he is resigning as Newsletter Editor and board member, effective December 31. Kent has stated that he is willing to mentor any volunteer who assumes his job, but thereafter he will just remain as a club member. I figure we will require at least four or five members to volunteer to fill all the roles Kent has served in over the past 10 years. First we will need someone with a voice loud enough to call us to order when it is time to get down to the business at hand. We will need a new editor for our newsletter. Third, we will need a living archive, someone who remembers all those members from the past and why they are no longer club members. We also need someone who can suggest new people to move into leadership roles within the club. We also need to have someone who knows Army time. After all, we need to know whether dinner is at 1745 or 1830. I am accepting applications.


TIME-SENSITIVE NEWS OF IMMEDIATE CONCERN:

The FFGA Summer Picnic got underway on a beautiful, warm day around noontime last Saturday, the 26th of July with 31 members and guests in attendance. Fortunately the picnic was held in a shady pavilion with a roof at Kenwood Recreational Park in Fayetteville. Two portable fans and plenty of ice water allowed at least a modicum of comfort. All of those in attendance received their deposits of \$5.00 per person back. They also enjoyed a free extra treat from the folks at "Truett's Luau" in the form of a Pineapple Smoothie for each person.

Truett's Luau is a new one-of-a-kind restaurant in Fayetteville. It is a part of the Chick-fil-A chain and it has a Waterfall patio, loads of orchids and strolling ukulele players. All agreed the smoothies were excellent.

Kent Vickers served as the Master-of-Ceremonies, and with the able assistance of his wife Erika, Faye Evans, John and Glenda Wilhelm and Cynthia Williams, the party was ready to greet FFGA's membership by 11:30 AM. Kent then explained what was to take place for the rest of the day, after a pre-selected box-lunch from Dickey's Barbecue Pit arrived.

Three competitive games were set up; *Horse Frisbee*, which required teams of four to alternatively throw disc-golf Frisbees into their opponent's hula-hoop circles to score points; *Darts*, where teams amassed points by throwing pointed missiles at a target; and *Fishing Hole*, where the teams gained points by snagging tongue depressors with top views of fish depicted upon them. Using dowel rods with a line, lead sinker and paper clip hook to snag the fish, the team members had five minutes to catch all of the fish that they could. Some of the fish were special and counted for more points. An additional *Hula Hooper* contest was open to all comers for a special award. Only two ladies felt that they were limber and agile enough to compete in this event.

When the barbecue lunch arrived, a pre-meal blessing which is used by many Friendship Force clubs was sung by all to the tune of the song *Edelweiss*. Thankfully the singing ability of the club had little effect on the excellent taste of the barbecue, because it was very plentiful and very good. After lunch, undaunted by their previous attempt at harmony, the members were led by Kent and Glenda in a rousing rendition of *Old McDonald's Farm*. In this singing game each member of the audience is given a small card face down with a farm animal's picture on it. They are told not to divulge to anyone what that animal is. The song leader begins singing and when he/she gets to the part: "and on this farm he had a ____", he/she holds up a larger card with a picture of an animal and the sound it makes. At that time the assistant, wearing a mask portraying the animal, makes sounds the animal would make and tries to act as the animal normally behaves. This is also simultaneously performed by all of those having the same smaller card. The song then continues on to the next animal and the process is repeated. This act was first performed in 2008 as our club's contribution to the entertainment at the FF Club of Fukuoka, Japan's 30th Anniversary and our welcome dinner. Members of our expedition had previously traveled to mysterious foreign locales where they had been forced to ride camels in Morocco, traverse the desert in Uzbekistan while suffering from food poisoning, and endured a massage in Tbilisi, but nothing prepared them for their Washington adventure. We all made our way across this great country to Spokane, encountering various misadventures like missed connections, unplanned layovers, and mechanical malfunctions that could have cost us our club’s president! Much to our relief, the natives proved to be friendly and most spoke fluent English.

The local food was palatable, even tasty. We were treated to a local specialty, "huckleberries" which grow wild in the nearby mountains and must be wrested away from fearsome bears that also enjoy them. Fortunately, no huckleberry-picking expeditions were on the schedule, because undoubtedly, brave as we are and interested in the local wildlife, most of us draw the line at bear encounters. The berries were served in pies and jams and even martinis!

We were escorted around the attractive downtown riverfront through which cascaded the mighty Spokane River and was the site of what the natives claimed was the famous "Expo '74." Most of us were too young to remember 1974, but we feigned interest. We went on a wine-tasting tour on the "Spokane Party Bus," but there was a large sign inside the bus that stated "What happens on the Party Bus stays on the Party Bus," so I can say no more. We also had a delightful journey into exotic Idaho for a day-long boat ride on Lake Coeur D'Alene. We saw ospreys and eagles and they had a make-your-own Bloody Mary bar which was enjoyed by some expedition members.

After five glorious days, we said goodbye to our hosts and to our own **Kent and Erika Vickers, Harvey and Mary Brickley, and Joan Sankey** who went off on their own further adventures. The rest of us flew Alaska Air to Seattle for the next part of our mission of peace. A motley crew from the Whidbey Island Friendship Force, our next hosts, greeted us at SeaTac Airport, whisked away our luggage (we did see it again) and showed us around downtown Seattle.

We were led to a walk-up seafood restaurant on the waterfront and experienced the local custom of dining al fresco all the while battling aggressive seagulls over who got to eat the French fries. After a grueling march through Seattle after which my hostess' pedometer said we had walked 6 miles and climbed the equivalent of 14 flights of stairs, we boarded a train and then a ferry to reach secluded Whidbey Island by nightfall.

The next morning we went on a guided beach walk along the shores of Useless Bay in which we encountered moon snails both dead and alive, gigantic pieces of seaweed, a large sand dollar bed, a breathtaking view of Mount Rainier, which is 85 miles away, and several busloads of sixth-graders on a field trip which did not seem to be nearly as educational as ours. Other adventures included a ferry trip to picturesque Port Townsend, full of Victorian houses, a tour of a lavender field, and general exploration of the island culture.

While the fortitude of our ambassadors hardly ever failed, there is one area that I am forced to admit where we embarrassed ourselves and we are in dire need of improvement. I am hereby proposing to the Board of Directors that we set aside sufficient funds for dance instruction for all future exchanges. “Parlez en francais’ in France”: (Speak French in France)

The Friendship Force Launches an Initiative to Speak the Native Language of the Host Country.

Susan Rawls went to France in June with a truly international group of Ambassadors to visit Hosts in the cities of Bordeaux and Toulouse, which are in the southwest part of the country. The fourteen members came from Australia, Brazil, Canada, Wales, England and several states in the USA. They met in Paris before taking the train south to meet their host families in Bordeaux. Susan, who is a confirmed Francophile, was excited to again visit France, as she had studied at the Sorbonne in Paris while in college. Although she had been fluent enough in the language to take courses and pass exams in French, that was many years ago, and she was somewhat nervous at the prospect of speaking “French only” for two weeks!

This trip to France was organized by long-time FF members Eileen Howell and Andrew Stirling, of Ottawa, Ontario. The goal of the exchanges was to recruit newcomers to Friendship Force among people who wanted to speak French because it is their first or second language, and to help build Friendship Force clubs in France. Eileen and Andrew also believe that it will be easier to recruit hosts in the future in other countries if they do not always have to be bilingual, which usually means speaking English.

Susan was warmly greeted at the station in Bordeaux by her host, Guy Batifoix. His wife Chrystiane was at home cooking a special welcome lunch of pheasant for her! The Batifoix live a few miles outside Bordeaux in the little village of Tabanac. The Friendship Force in Bordeaux had been recently formed with the help of Eileen Howell and Andrew Stirling, and Susan’s group was their first hosting experience. The hosts were great friends with one another, and all of them went out of their way to show off “la belle vie bordelaise”, (Bordeaux the beautiful life.) One of her favorite days of the visit was a picnic at a small chateau and winery owned by a friend of one of the hosts. Each host family brought food and wine (lots of wine!) to the picnic. the trees for a leisurely afternoon of eating, getting to know one another, a walk to an old church, and a visit to the “cave” where the host stores all his bottled wine. Susan admits she could not follow all of his technical explanations in French of how the vines are cultivated, harvested, and the wine is made.

After a week in Bordeaux, the group took a two-hour train ride to Toulouse, which like the city of Bordeaux, is also on the Garonne River. While Bordeaux is built of beautiful limestone, she says that Toulouse is a “pink city”, built almost entirely of pink brick. This time her hosts were still in the workforce, so they took turns taking their guests sightseeing. Susan stayed with Annie and Pascal Duvert. Annie is a judge, and Pascal works in IT with Air France. In the city, the group visited the beautiful Basilica of St. Sernin, built in the 12th and 13th centuries. It is the largest Romanesque cathedral in France. Susan was especially thrilled to see this wonderful building, because as a student she focused on medieval art and architecture for her art history degrees. Their hosts also twice drove them outside the city. They visited the medieval walled city of Carcassonne, and a “village Gaulois”, a reconstructed Celtic village featuring thatched roofs, to see demonstrations of crafts done in the manner of the Celts, 2000 years ago.

One particularly fun evening the group experienced “Franglish” at one of the home of one of the hosts. This is a meeting of French speakers who want to improve their English and English speakers who want to improve their French. One person from each group is partnered with another from the other group for 15 minutes in which they speak only French for half the time, and English for half the time. Then they switch partners! Sort of like speed dating, but with a glass of wine in hand as one moves around the room, all with the purpose of helping the other’s language skill. Besides their ambassadors, the group included French business people, students, and those looking to travel abroad.

Susan reports that this was such a successful FF experience that while riding through the beautiful French countryside she thought, “After this trip I can die happy!” Oh, and how did she manage speaking French for two weeks? She said, “Although I could read and understand most of what I came across, my French conversation had slipped to only ‘passable’ after so many years. I need more work on those pesky verbs!”



Malawi: The Warm Heart of Africa Welcomes the Friendship Force!

Eight ambassadors participated in the very first Friendship Force Discovery Exchange to Malawi, known as the "warm heart of Africa", from June 26 through July 2. Five FFGA members: Bertha Dhillon, Wilma Kirchhofer, Glenda and John Wilhelm, and Cynthia Williams along with Tahirah Asim-Ali, a friend of Wilma's from Boulder, Colorado, were welcomed by their hosts in Zomba, Malawi. Two additional ladies, one from Pennsylvania and one from Massachusetts, traveled with us.

Our main purpose was to help the people in Zomba form a Friendship Force club. They did an excellent job of preparing an interesting program for us, during which we were able to learn about the culture and natural beauty of Malawi. This is a very young country, having been granted its independence from the British Commonwealth in 1964. There are stark contrasts between the "rich" and the poor, but one can readily see the great efforts that are being made to improve the infrastructure, health care and education.

Malawi is a country of great natural beauty. Lake Malawi, home of fish found only there, and the splendid views from the Zomba Plateau will be seen in everyone's photographs. Several ambassadors found lovely souvenirs at the Dedza Pottery. The fascinating history and culture of Malawi were beautifully displayed at the Mua Cultural Center, where we had one of the most animated and knowledgeable guides I have seen anywhere. The food was delicious and plentiful. Rice and nsima (rather like polenta) are basic to most meals, with meat and lots of fresh vegetables. Fresh fruits and fruit juices were also abundant. Some of us tried baobab juice, which is an acquired taste, much like the Beverly brand of drink at the World of Coca-Cola! Tea is one of the main crops of Malawi and is served more often than coffee.

We were able to visit two "feeding stations", run by Mary Mangwiza, who was one of our host Exchange Directors. They serve children whose parents may be deceased or unable to care for them who are living with other relatives. They receive a basic pre-K education and two meals a day. It was so rewarding to see their eager little faces as they participated in their lessons, generally in classes of up to forty children. But it was also sad to realize that there are thousands and thousands of children who don't get even these basic elements of life.

Our hosts all spoke excellent English, which made conversation easy and rewarding. I think the ambassadors came home with a much greater understanding of this small African country that many only know from Madonna's adoption of her sons and her charitable work there. We were also reminded that everyone loves and is proud of his/her home country, no matter how large or small, rich or poor.

1 Friendship Force Builds a Bridge for the Future: (Atlanta, Georgia - 6.23.14)

Today, FFI's President and CEO, Joy DiBenedetto announced the launch of the organization's NextGen Initiative, an exciting opportunity to help shape the future of Friendship Force International. For some time members have been pressing to include younger, working people. This new initiative will retain the pillars of home hosting and hospitality that are the hallmark of Friendship Force, yet make it possible for working people to discover the Friendship Force experience.

The NextGen Initiative will introduce several new travel/home hosting opportunities especially designed to appeal to the interests and energy of the Next Generation.

"We cannot build this bridge alone, nor can we build it without modern tools," said DiBenedetto. New web-based tools will be introduced to make communication easier and faster. The organization is also exploring new, shorter models for home hosting. *"I have gathered some of the most dynamic people I know to help with their vision, talent, and creativity,"* DiBenedetto noted. *"I am proud to announce these two groups today."*

The NextGen Council - Young leaders from 17 countries will constitute an advisory body reporting directly to the CEO. These leaders from various cultural backgrounds are ideally suited to adapt current exchange models to the interests of Next Generation travelers. They may also help connect Friendship Force to their own social networks, create and lead exchanges, as well as generate interest in Next Generation travel, home hosting, and hospitality.

The NextGen Mentors – A team of experienced leaders, from clubs in every major region of the world, who will work with Field Representatives and club executives to attract clusters of young participants from local communities, and shape travel and home hosting around their interests. Mentors are already at work preparing the launch of an information campaign. Their role is to anticipate needs, provide training, promote best

practices, and hands-on guidance to clubs and leaders as this new initiative is introduced.

Jack Mullen, Chair of the Friendship Force International Board of Directors, agrees: *"Connecting people for the purpose of growing international friendships and peace is essential in today's world. It is worth every ounce of energy we have. Every age is suited for that purpose and every station in life is made richer by changing the way we see and experience the world."*

We travelers are both America's ambassadors to the world...and the world's ambassadors to America."

The Wilhelms and I are planning to ask FFI to have Rick Steves be the main speaker at the conference in Vancouver in August of 2015.
