SOUVENIRS: We have souvenirs of Friendship Force exchanges all around our house. They are constant reminders that evoke fond memories of fascinating places we've seen and interesting people we've met. As you walk in the front door there are two etchings from Saint Petersburg, Russia. One is of Peter and Paul Cathedral; the other of Saint Isaac's Cathedral. We were there in 1993 while the country was still in a transition period, adjusting to the failure of communism. In brilliant contrast to the everyday drabness, the interiors of these buildings reflected the opulence of czarist times with columns of malachite and lapis lazuli. Our Friendship Force hosts, Yevgeny Ippilotov and his wife Luda Ippilotova, were exceedingly gracious, but we got a dose of reality when he opened the doors to their apartment. There were two doors, each with three locks on them. In contrast, one evening they took us to an exquisite performance of Swan Lake ballet. The tickets cost only 65 cents because Luda is the daughter of a survivor of the 880 day siege of Leningrad during World War II. A soft drink at intermission was 75 cents.

In a drawer nearby are two ceramic knives. Mary won them as a door prize at a party of retired mining engineers near Gelsenkirchen, Germany in 2009. The last coal mine in the Ruhr valley had closed three years earlier because coal can now be mined in China and shipped to Germany cheaper than they can extract it locally. Even without the ability to speak German we could sense the feeling of nostalgia those men felt as they reminisced about the days in the mines. Nonetheless, nothing had taken away their enthusiasm when it came to singing and drinking beer. They had a karaoke DJ, and it wasn't long before we too were singing along with our hosts, Ingrid and Dieter Look, despite not knowing the words. Beer improves your singing, particularly on the chorus.

Grace and Ken Fiksen were our guests when the first Friendship Force ambassadors from Newcastle-Upon-Tyne landed in Atlanta on July 4, 1977. The following June we visited them. It was big news in Newcastle a few months earlier when a large construction project had been suddenly halted. While tearing down and removing a 19th century building to make room for a new one, they discovered a Roman fort beneath the rubble. The site became an archeological dig. Our hosts knew the parents of a shift supervisor on the site, so we went for a look. We received a first-hand update on the dig. As he finished, he pulled a zip lock bag full of pottery shards off his desk and sifted through them. He pulled one out and handed it to Mary saying, "Here's a piece with a hair on it. You can keep it as a souvenir." Mary scrutinized that piece of pottery, looking for that hair until someone pointed out the hare (rabbit) that was part of the pot's design. A week later, on a side trip to London, we visited the British Museum. In the Roman section we found a complete pot like the one our shard came from. That's why I can tell you our piece is in the style of Casurius who made pots in central Gaul between 160 and 180 C.E. It is easily our oldest souvenir. It resides in a shadow box on a book shelf in our family room.

I hope you are gathering souvenirs as you go through your Friendship Force career. They will become a treasure trove that generates fond memories of people and places.







WALK THE PATHWAYS TO FREEDOM: DISCOVER AFRICAN-AMERICAN HISTORY IN THE U.S.A.

Exchange Director Wilma Kirchofer reports that the Global exchange about civil rights has now been reduced to two cities instead of three, as Cincinnati, Ohio has dropped out. The exchange will now start in Atlanta, Georgia and then travel to Birmingham, Alabama. Each city will highlight its own unique historical events and current progress in advancing civil rights. FFGA's portion will take place during the week of the 21st through the 27th of September with up to 20 Ambassadors expected. The tentative itinerary for the Atlanta portion will focus on Dr. Martin Luther King Junior's leadership, the accomplishments of the Atlanta University system and the advances of the African-American business community in Atlanta. Ambassadors will also visit the newly-constructed Civil Rights Museum near Centennial Olympic Park. Current News from Friendship Force International:

1. Travel Insurance: Almost all Friendship Force Ambassadors know that FF policy requires that all exchange travelers must have travel insurance before they depart. In lieu of that they must sign, and have notarized, a waiver form absolving their hosts, the clubs involved in the exchange and FFI from any liability.

For many years FFI has had a cooperative arrangement with **Travel Guard®** insurance that provided our members with discounted travel insurance and also paid a small commission to FFI when purchased through the FFI website. **Travel Guard®** has generally provided excellent customer service and presumably will continue to do so. Therefore, FFI is continuing to offer a link to that company on the FFI website even though their rates have now been increased to stay competitive. Along with this increase came a wider range of products from which to choose. The insurance policy called "Vacation and Cruise" is the one most similar to our previous plan, and it is NOT based on age. FFI requires that all ambassadors purchase travel insurance, but ambassadors are free to purchase it from any company. A waiver form may be downloaded and later printed by holding down the Ctrl key and clicking on the following link http://www.thefriendshipforce.org/index.php/site/clubresources_forms. Next click on the drop down menu "Exchange Documents" and scroll down to "Travel Insurance Waiver Form". Click on either MSWord or PDF on the right to bring up the document to your monitor's screen.

2. Enrichment Voyages: During the past three years, many Friendship Force members have enjoyed our partnership with the Enrichment Voyages program by the Institute for Shipboard Education. However, we regret to announce that following the on-going "Iron and Ice" voyage the Enrichment Voyages program will be discontinued. FFI is working with the sponsoring cruise line to define their ongoing partnership and is working to establish new partnerships with other cultural cruises. The FFI staff is looking forward to providing new and exciting opportunities to Friendship Force members in the near future.
