Make friends with some Ukrainians!

Five Ukrainian officials, their traveling escort and a translator arrive in metro Atlanta on Feb. 22 for a nine-day tour that will include visits with state lawmakers, county officials and city officials, including three local mayors.

The tour — arranged through the Open World Leadership Center, a creation of the U.S. Congress — will focus on how our local governments operate and how they prepare their budgets.

FFGA volunteers arranged the meetings and are hosting the visitors. They will stay in the homes of FFGA members and be escorted about town by club members. Several members plan to host small dinner parties for the delegates

Sunday, Feb. 24 Delegates and hosts meet with Dr. Joseph Knippenberg at Oglethorpe University for an overview discussion of local governments and taxation followed by a chat with Oglethorpe students.

Monday, Feb. 25 Delegates and hosts spend a morning at the Georgia Capitol (at right), where they will tour the historic building and meet with Sen. Elena Parent and Rep. Scott Holcomb at their Capitol offices. In the afternoon, delegates visit Decatur to meet with Mayor Patti Garrett and attend a City Council meeting.

Tuesday, Feb. 26 Delegates and hosts attend a DeKalb County Commission meeting and meet with Commissioner Jeff Rader. In the afternoon, delegates and hosts will meet at MARTA HQ with MARTA board member Bob Dallas, who also chairs the Dunwoody Planning Commission.

Wednesday, Feb. 27 Delegates and hosts meet with Dunwoody City Councilmember Terry Nall and Dunwoody Budget Director Chris Pike at Dunwoody City Hall and with Sandy Springs Mayor Rusty Paul at Sandy Springs' new City Hall and Performing Arts Center. (at left)



Thursday, Feb. 28 Delegates and hosts meet State Labor Commissioner Mark Butler at the Georgia Department of Labor and Atlanta City Councilman Amir Farokhi at Atlanta City Hall. In the evening, several FFGA members host small dinner parties in their homes for delegates.

Friday, March 1 Delegates and hosts tour Atlanta History Center in the morning and delegates spend the afternoon with hosts. A farewell party featuring the Peavine Creek String Band, dancing and barbecue begins at 6.

on Thursday, Feb. 28.

The five delegates are: a 24-year-old city financial official; a 31-year-old consultant to local governments; a 29-year-old analyst with an NGO; a 27-year-old public policy advocate; and a 24-year-old assistant to a member of the Ukrainian Parliament.

As an FFGA member, you'll have a number of chances to meet the Ukrainians and to join in part of the program. Here are some events you may find especially appealing:

—An "Evening With the Ukrainians" Party planned for Saturday, Feb. 23. We're still working out final details, but members are invited to come join us for supper and a chance to hear the delegates talk about their country. There may be a nominal charge for food. More details to come via email.

—Delegates, hosts and any FFGA members also are invited to strap on their square-dancing shoes for the Farewell Party at the end of the visit. The party, on Friday, March 1, will feature barbecue and dancing to music played live by the Peavine Creek String Band. More details to come via email.

Our mission is to break down the barriers that separate people and our tagline is "Experience Different Views. Discover Common Ground." I use this description often and consider it my "elevator pitch," a quick and succinct way to tell people about the Friendship Force.

There are many ways to be active with Friendship Force both on the local and international level.

You can participate by being a home host, a dinner host, a day host or even a Host Coordinator, the person who facilitates the program and home hosting assignments for an inbound journey together. You can travel outbound with your local club or another club or with people from all over the world on a globally recruited journey.
